5.2 REVIEW AND PROVIDE DIRECTION ON CITY COUNCIL CHAMBER SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS

Police Captain Tracie Shea provided a presentation that included various security enhancement options for the City Council Chamber. The options discussed included: (Option 1) law enforcement personnel and K-9 officer presence at all City Council meetings; (Option 2) hand-held wand screening; and (Option 3) a walk-through metal detector, bag screening, and secondary hand-held wand screening. A question and answer period followed the presentation. City Manager Stephen Salvatore, City Attorney Salvador Navarrete, and Police K-9 Officer Armstrong provided additional information.

Vice Mayor Torres-O'Callaghan made a motion to proceed with Option 2. A discussion ensued among the City Council regarding a substitute motion. City Attorney Salvador Navarrete provided guidance on the matter.

The proposed resolution regarding City Council Chamber security improvements was not adopted. Instead, the City Council provided direction to staff based on the clarified motion made by Vice Mayor Torres-O'Callaghan.

5.4 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING AND COMPENSATION PLANS BETWEEN THE CITY OF LATHROP, LATHROP MID-MANAGERS AND CONFIDENTIAL EMPLOYEES (LMCEA), SERVICE EMPLOYEES INTERNATIONAL UNION LOCAL 1021 (SEIU), DEPARTMENT HEADS AND UNREPRESENTED CLASSIFICATIONS, UNREPRESENTED SWORN CLASSIFICATIONS, CITY COUNCIL BENEFITS, AND LATHROP POLICE OFFICER'S ASSOCIATION (LPOA) BARGAINING

Deputy City Manager Thomas Hedegard provided a presentation regarding the proposed agreements for City Council consideration, including compensation and benefit provisions common to the proposed bargaining units and unrepresented groups, group-specific benefit highlights, the sworn recruitment incentive program, and an update on labor relations with the Lathrop Police Officers Association.

During the presentation, the City Council temporarily lost its quorum when Councilmember Lazard stepped away from the dais. The meeting was recessed at 9:32 p.m. and reconvened at 9:34 p.m. upon Councilmember Lazard's return.
