LATHROP POLICE DEPARTMENT - GO LIVE

The senior staff of the newly formed City of Lathrop Police Department officially received their police badges during a ceremony at Lathrop City Hall on Tuesday, May 17th. Chief of Police Raymond Bechler, Police Commanders Kyle Oki and Stephen Sealy, and the department's Sergeants assumed full operations on June 29th, becoming the first Police Department for the growing City of Lathrop. For three decades, law enforcement responsibilities were provided through contracted services with the San Joaquin County Sheriff's Department. City officials worked diligently for over two years toward a seamless transition from contracted law enforcement services to standing up their very own department. The transition is now complete, and the new police force is patrolling the streets of Lathrop and protecting its residents.

"The pinning ceremony was another step forward towards the establishment of our very own Police Department and was a pivotal moment in our growing city's history," said Stephen J. Salvatore, City Manager for the City of Lathrop. "We are grateful for the decades of service provided to our residents via the San Joaquin County Sheriff's Department and are also looking forward to completing this transition process, thus providing enhanced benefits to the residents of Lathrop while also being fiscally prudent with our city finances."

Chief Raymond Bechler was chosen to be Lathrop's first Police Chief in September of 2021. Since assuming the leadership position within the department, Chief Bechler diligently worked to hire the sworn and non-sworn personnel who make up the department, secured the necessary equipment to conduct operations, put finishing touches on the new Lathrop Police Department Headquarters, and met with the residents of Lathrop at community events and town hall meetings.

Now fully operational, Chief Bechler said, "It is an exciting time to be able to showcase to the people of Lathrop what we've worked so hard to build for them. It has been no small task to get to where we are today, but thanks to our exceptional team and incredible amount of support from City staff, the Mayor, and the City Council, we have rolled out something special for the community. I think the residents of Lathrop will be very proud of what we've accomplished, in no small part because of the amount of engagement and feedback we've received from every corner of this city."



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LATHROP: Now serving over 31,331 residents

For the first time since incorporating as a City in 1989, Lathrop's resident population has surpassed the 30,000 mark. Deemed as one of the fastest growing Cities in California by the State Department of Finance, Lathrop's population increased by 6.6% to 31,331 people from January 1, 2021 to January 1, 2022.

The City's growth is reflective in the number of new homes being built throughout River Islands and Stanford Crossing. The growth impact has also been instrumental in the formation of a new Lathrop Police Department whose commission was effective July 1, 2022; the City's ability to attract more retail development like Sprouts Farmers Market, Dutch Bros, Sonic, Maverik, and Fairfield Inn by Marriott; and continued attraction of large industrial employers, such as Tesla, Ryder, Kraft Foods, Food 4 Less (PAQ, Inc.), and Medline, who have chosen to locate and expand in our community.

Affordable Connectivity Program

Your household may be eligible to receive a monthly discount on a new or existing internet service plan with the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). As part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, the ACP provides eligible households \$30 per month off of their internet bills. Approximately, twenty (20) leading internet providers will offer ACP-eligible households a high-speed internet plan for no more than \$30 per month. Don't Run Off! TIPS TO KEEP WATER IN YOUR YARD

Harmful runoff can occur when water (either rain or irrigation) comes into contact with and washes pesticides, soil, or other products used around your home into storm drains and waterways. Help reduce harmful runoff and protect local waterbodies by using less-toxic products and slowing the flow of pollutants from your yard and garden.

Integrated Pest Management (IPM)

A simple way to help keep pesticides out of the local waterbodies is to reduce the amount of chemicals you

apply to your yard and garden. To do this, while managing pest problems effectively, you can use Integrated Pest Management (IPM), which focuses on low- to no-pesticide methods of pestcontrol, such as:



- **Prevention** Prevent pests from becoming a problem in the first place. For more information about pest prevention visit http://ipm.ucanr.edu/PDF/PUBS/Spring_2022_homegarden-pest-newsletter.pdf.
- **Alternatives** Use alternatives to pesticides for pest control, such as traps, physical removal, natural deterrents, and/or natural predators.

Water-Conscious Landscaping

If pesticides must be used, be sure to follow these landscaping tips to help keep water and chemicals in your yard and out of our creeks and rivers.

• Avoid Overwatering
Overwatering and overspray will lead to increased runoff which can carry along the pesticides you apply.

Porous Surfaces

Use gravel, stones, or pavers to allow water to soak into the soil in areas where you don't have plants. Consider adding mulch to your garden to keep your soil moist, reduce evaporation, and restrict weed growth.

- **Plant Native** Plant vegetation that is naturally found in California ecosystems and requires little to no watering. This reduces the need for irrigation, as well as the potential for harmful runoff. Find native plants for your garden by visiting https://gardenplanner.calscape.org.
- **Timing** Wet and windy weather can spread pesticides to unintended places. Be sure not to apply pesticides (especially sprays) on windy days or right before a rainstorm. Learn more about safely applying pesticides at http://ipm.ucanr.edu/WATER/U/safeuse.html.


