

## WATERS WILL FLOW STORM WATER AND PESTICIDES



California's wet weather season typically falls between October and April, and storm water runoff from these seasonal storms can have a big impact on our local water quality.

Storm water is water

from rain or snowmelt that flows over the landscape. This water can then travel, untreated, into the storm drain system and ultimately to the local waterbodies. As the storm water comes into contact with the urban landscape it can become contaminated with substances such as motor oil, pet waste, trash, and pesticides, which can harm our waterways.

## Pesticides and Water Quality

Pesticides are toxic chemicals that are intended to kill pests, such as unwanted insects and plants. However, if these chemicals end up in our waterways, they can



harm the aquatic plants and animals.

Follow these tips to help keep pesticides out of our streams and rivers:

- Consider less-toxic alternatives first. Visit Our Water, Our World (<a href="https://ourwaterourworld.org">https://ourwaterourworld.org</a>) to learn more.
- Always read product labels and follow the instructions when applying chemicals.
- Choose ready-to-use products instead of concentrates to reduce the risk of spills and chemical exposure.
  - o If you do spill a pesticide, clean it up immediately by using something absorbent, like cat litter, sawdust, or paper towels, to soak up the chemical. Dispose of the absorbent material at a household hazardous waste facility. Never wash a spilled pesticide into the street or a storm drain!

### **Pyrethroid Pesticides in Our Water**

Pyrethroids are man-made chemicals found in many pesticide products because they're good at managing pests. However, these chemicals can become a problem in our waterbodies because they don't break down in the environment easily and can continue to harm aquatic plants and animals long after the pesticide is applied. Pyrethroid active ingredient names almost always end in -thrin. Be sure to read the labels of pesticide products and avoid products with the following active ingredients, if possible:

- Permethrin
- Bifenthrin
- Cyfluthrin
- Beta-cyfluthrin
- Cypermethrin
- Deltamethrin
- Lambda-cyhalothrin
- Tralomethrin
- Esfenvalerate

(an exception to the -thrin rule!)

If you're interested in purchasing less-toxic pesticide products, next time you're at your local garden supply store, be sure to look for "point-of-purchase" displays, such as shelf edging or tags, display stands with fact sheets, banners, and other educational materials. ### ACTIVITY FEE ASSISTANCE

The City of Lathrop Activity Fee Assistance Fund is designed to assist qualifying Lathrop residents with registration fees for Parks & Recreation programs. The Activity Fee Assistance Program is funded from various revenue sources including the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. Approved residents will be eligible for a maximum of up to \$250.00 per fiscal year (July 1 – June 30). Financial assistance will be granted to pay 75% of any program as long as funds are available. ## **HAPPINESS IS** A WARM PET

Now that we are in the winter months, please keep in mind that ALL animals need shelter from cold, wet weather. The best way to protect pets is to keep them indoors. If animals are not allowed inside the home, alternate shelter such as a wind/water-proof doghouse, or access to the garage should be provided. Outdoor pets need more calories in the winter to produce body heat so you may want to increase the amount of food you are feeding.

Lathrop Animal Center reminds you to think about your pet's safety and recommends the following guidelines to protect your companion animal:

- Keep your cats inside. Outdoor cats can freeze, become lost or stolen, injured or killed.
- During the winter, seeking shelter and warmth, outdoor cats sometimes choose to sleep under the hoods of cars where it is warmer. Many cats have been seriously injured or killed by radiator fan blades after crawling up under the engine. On cold mornings, before starting your car you should bang loudly on the hood of your car or slap it noisily to startle any animal sleeping there and wait a few seconds to give the animal a chance to escape. to escape.
- If you plan to travel to the snow, never let your dog off the leash on snow or ice, especially during a snowstorm. Dogs frequently lose their scent in snow and ice and can easily become lost. More dogs are lost in the winter than any other season, so make sure they always wear I.D. tags.
  Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach when they come in out of the sleet, snow or ice. Salt, antifreeze or other chemicals could hurt your dog if ingested while licking their paws.



- If you have a short-haired breed, consider getting a warm coat or sweater with a high collar or turtleneck for your dog. Look for one that covers the dog from the base of the tail on top to the belly underneath. While this may seem like a luxury, it is a necessity
- Never leave your dog or cat alone in a car during the cold weather. A car can act as a refrigerator in the winter, holding in the cold. Your companion animal could freeze to death.

- If your dog is sensitive to the cold due to age, illness or breed type, take them outdoors only long enough to relieve themselves. Puppies do not tolerate the cold as well as adult dogs and may be difficult to housebreak during the winter.

  If your dog spends a lot of time engaged in outdoor activities, increase their supply of food, particularly protein, to keep their fur thick and healthy.
- Make sure your companion animal has a warm place to sleep and is far away from drafts and off the floor. You should consider a dog or cat bed or basket with a warm blanket or pillow in it.
